What is Hepatitis C?

Hepatitis C (HCV) is a virus that attacks the liver. The liver acts as the body's filter by removing toxins (harmful substances) from anything you eat, drink, inhale, inject, or put into your bodv.

Did You Know?

The liver is essential to your health. The liver helps with digestion and blood clotting.

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You cannot survive without **your liver!**









Symptoms of Hepatitis C







Dark pee, pale

yellowing of skin or eyes (jaundice)

stomach pain

nausea or vomiting

tiredness

fever

loss of appetite

poop, or diarrhea

Acute Hepatitis C

- lasts 6 or less months
- Only 15-25% of people will experience symptoms
- Your body may clear the virus on its own without treatment
- Even if you cleared the virus on your own or through treatment, you can still get HCV again



Chronic Hepatitis C

- Lifelong condition if not treated
- More than 50% of adults with acute HCV will develop chronic HCV
- If untreated, serious complications such as cirrhosis (scarring of liver), liver cancer, and even death can occur
- Treatment is curative and can prevent serious complications

Understanding Test Results

Antibody (Screening)

- This test determines if you have ever been exposed to the hepatitis C virus.
- Once you have been diagnosed with hepatitis C, your antibody test will remain reactive (positive) for the rest of your life, even if you are treated and cured.

Type of Tests





RNA (Confirmatory)

- This test determines if you currently have hepatitis C virus in your body.
- If detected (positive), then you have the hepatitis C virus in your body and can spread the virus to others.
- If not detected (negative), then you do not have the hepatitis c virus in your body and cannot spread it to others.

How Does Hepatitis C Spread?

Hepatitis C is spread when the blood of someone with hepatitis C mixes with tiny, invisible amounts of blood from someone without hepatitis C.



Hepatitis C can also be passed during pregnancy and childbirth if the pregnant person has untreated hepatitis C.

Hepatitis C can also be spread through unsterile piercing and tattooing practices. Always go to a licensed facility.



- Liver damage can happen over months to years so early intervention is best.
- Hepatitis C treatment can be as simple as taking 1-3 pills a day for 2-3 months.
- Most people notice few to no side effects from treatment medications.
- Over 95% of people treated are cured.

What Does Being Cured Mean?

- Hepatitis C virus is no longer in your blood.
- You will not be able to spread hepatitis C to others.
- You can get hepatitis C again if exposed, so protect yourself from coming into contact with anyone else's blood.

REMEMBER

- Keep all your appointments, including those after completing treatment.
- Take medications as prescribed and follow your healthcare provider's instructions.
