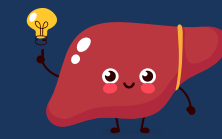


HEPATITIS FAST FACTS



Hepatitis **A**

caused by hepatitis A virus (HAV)

Lasts up to... **6** months

Hepatitis A spreads by:

- Eating/drinking things contaminated with human waste (poop)
- Close person-to-person contact, including sex, with a person that has hepatitis A
- Exposure to blood of someone with hepatitis A

Hepatitis A is RARELY life threatening!

Hepatitis **B**

caused by hepatitis B virus (HBV)

Lasts up to... **Lifetime**
if it progresses from acute to chronic

Hepatitis B spreads by:

- Contact with blood or bodily fluids of someone living with hepatitis B
- Condomless sex with a person that has hepatitis B
- Passed from mother to baby during pregnancy or birth

Hepatitis B CAN become life threatening!

Hepatitis **C**

caused by hepatitis C virus (HCV)

Lasts up to... **Lifetime**
if it progresses from acute to chronic

Hepatitis C spreads by:

- Contact with blood of someone living with hepatitis C
- Condomless sex with a person that has hepatitis C
- Passed from mother to baby during pregnancy or birth

Hepatitis C CAN become life threatening!

yellowing of skin or eyes (jaundice)



stomach pain



nausea or vomiting



tiredness



fever



loss of appetite



Dark pee, pale poop,
or diarrhea

WHAT ARE PREVENTION OPTIONS?

GET VACCINATED!

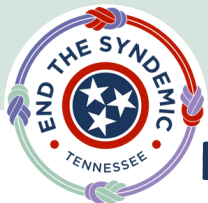
- Wash hands with soap & water after using the bathroom and before preparing or eating food
- Use condoms consistently & correctly during sex

GET VACCINATED!

- Do not share items that may come in contact with another person's blood, including needles or other equipment used to prepare, inject, or snort drugs
- Use condoms consistently & correctly during sex
- Avoid unregulated tattoos or piercings

VACCINE NOT AVAILABLE!

- Do not share items that may come in contact with another person's blood, including needles or other equipment used to prepare, inject, or snort drugs
- Use condoms consistently & correctly during sex
- Avoid unregulated tattoos or piercings
